Always make sure your firearm is unloaded before you place the equipment on the firearm. Verify that the chamber is empty, particularly if you stop the procedure and resume at a later time. Safe handling rules should be followed at all times.

If a scope is mounted too far to the rear of a weapon, the eyepiece can injure the shooter's brow. Shooting at an uphill angle also increases this risk, because it shortens the distance between the brow and the rear of the scope. When mounting your scope, we recommend positioning it as far forward in the mounts as possible.

With hard-recoiling rifles, serious injury or even death can result from eyepiece impact when discharging the firearm.

BEFORE SHOOTING THE FIREARM, verify that your installation provides sufficient space between the eyepiece and the scope to account for the recoil generated by your rifle.

NOTE: Give special attention to this warning when shooting uphill and/or from a prone position. These shooting conditions can dramatically reduce space allotted for recoil between your eyes and the weapon. PLEASE maintain maximum distance when shooting magnum firearms or firearms with heavy recoil. THE USER ASSUMES ALL RESPONSIBILITY AND LIABILITY FOR HAVING THE RIFLESCOPE PROPERLY MOUNTED TO A FIREARM AND USING THE RIFLESCOPE PROPERLY. ALWAYS CHECK THE CONDITION OF YOUR MOUNTING SYSTEM PRIOR TO USING YOUR FIREARM.

This product contains natural rubber latex, which may cause allergic reactions! The FDA has reported an increase in the number of deaths associated with sensitivity to natural latex proteins. Recommends that you use an eyecup on the eyepiece of the day scope, to allow for maximum comfort, space, and to remain undetected.

CAUTION:

- To prevent thermal damage to the equipment, never point it (whether ON or OFF) directly at the sun or any other source of high intensity light that the unprotected human eye cannot tolerate (such as a welding arc). To prevent accidental exposure to these types of sources, never leave the equipment around without the objective lens cap secured.
- DO NOT dismantle the equipment.
- Keep the equipment clean. Protect it from moisture, dramatic temperature changes, and electrical shocks.
- DO NOT force the equipment controls past their stopping points.
- DO NOT leave the equipment activated during periods of non-operation.
- DO NOT store the equipment without first removing the batteries.
- Thoroughly clean and dry all items before placing them into the storage case.
- To avoid deformation or damage, remove the light suppressor from the Anaconda before placing the equipment in storage.
- Scope Mounting Systems are not recommended for installing the Anaconda on firearms with dynamic recoil (0.308 Win or stronger).

NOTES:

- The optical axes of the Anaconda and day scope should be aligned. The distance between the
 axes should not exceed 3 mm. If the difference in the axis heights of the Anaconda and day
 scope above the weapon rail exceeds 3 mm, you will need to replace the day scope mounting
 rings or monoblock.
- To avoid losing unsaved data, DO NOT remove the batteries or disconnect the external power source while the Anaconda is on.
- Inadvertent sun damage is not considered a defect in material or workmanship, and is therefore not covered in the product warranty.

1 GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

The Anaconda is a thermal sensitive device. It can sense differences in heat emitted by objects in its field of view, and converts the received temperature pattern into a viewable image that represents the scene in black and white or a color pattern, depending on the selected image palette.

NOTE:

It is important that the Anaconda sensor receive sufficient thermal contrast between the target and background area, or between the different parts of a target. For example, there would be a vast temperature contrast between the snow and any heat target (such as an animal), making it exceptionally easy to distinguish the target.

The Anaconda consists of two primary parts: a thermal imaging device and a mount. The equipment comes with the mount secured to the body of the device (as shown in Figure 1-1).

The main optical-electronic components of the Anaconda include: an objective thermal lens, an output lens, a thermal-imaging camera, a display, a control card, and a button control panel. The Anaconda is equipped with manual objective lens focusing.

Anaconda series clip-ons are based on FLIR Tau 2 cameras that offer improved overall image quality in a wide range of dynamic thermal environments.

To accommodate individual user needs, the Anaconda has a variety of digitally controlled options, such as:

- Display brightness
- Palette color selection
- User-Controlled, Manual Non-Uniformity Correction/ Flat-Field Correction (UCMNUC/ FFC)
- Custom settings

Information on the current operating state (battery status, active function, etc.) is continuously shown, making field operation of the Anaconda simple and convenient.

Manufactured for exceptional durability, the Anaconda has a lightweight and robust aluminum body. A side Picatinny/Weaver rail allows the user to install an optional HD Video Recorder, WiFi Attachment, Extended Battery Pack, or other equipment.

A standard NTSC/PAL video input/output connector enables an external video display (monitor, TV) or video recorder to be connected to the Anaconda.

The Anaconda is powered by two CR123A ($2\times3V$) batteries. An external 6VDC/600mA power source and USB power bank can also be connected to the Anaconda.

The quick-release mount of the Anaconda fits any Picatinny, MIL-STD-1913, or Weaver weapon rail. The mount's lever-cam clamping device ensures easy, quick, and reliable mounting and removal.

The Anaconda is shown in Figure 1-2. The ITEM column of Table 1-1 indicates the number used to identify items in Figure 1-2.

NOTE:

Here and below, the model Anaconda TC50-640 is used for the example.

2 OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS

2.1 INSTALLATION AND MOUNTING

2.1.1 BATTERY INSTALLATION

CAUTION:

Verify that the equipment is off before installing a battery.

Install two CR123A batteries as follows (refer to Figure 2-1):

- 1. Unscrew the battery cap (A).
- 2. Remove the battery cassette (B).
- 3. Insert the batteries (C) into the cassette. Align the polarity symbols on the batteries with the polarity symbols on the cassette.
- 4. Reinsert the cassette with installed batteries.
- 5. Replace the battery cap.

2.1.2 INSTALLING THE ANACONDA ON A PICATINNY/WEAVER RAIL

🕂 WARNING:

Always make sure your firearm is unloaded before you place the equipment on the firearm. Always verify that the chamber is empty, especially if you stop the procedure and resume later. Safe handling rules should be followed at all times.



AGM recommends that you use an eyecup on the day scope's eyepiece for maximum safety and comfort, as well as to escape detection.

NOTE:

The optical axes of the Anaconda and day scope should be aligned. The distance between the axes should not exceed 3 mm. If the difference in the axis heights of the Anaconda and day scope above the weapon rail exceeds 3 mm, you will need to replace the day scope mounting rings or monoblock.

The Anaconda comes fully assembled with a Picatinny/Weaver mount (Figure 2-2).

The mount is (A) coupled with a riser (B) and attached to the Anaconda seating rail (C) with two $M4\times 20$ flathead socket cap screws (D).

Figure 2-3 shows the Anaconda mounted in front of a day scope.

To install the Anaconda on a Picatinny/Weaver rail, do the following:

- 1. Unscrew the output lens cap and place it in the storage case.
- 2. Remove the light suppressor from the storage case. Screw it into the thread of the output lens in place of the cap.
- 3. Unlock the clamping device (A) of the Anaconda mount by pushing down on the lever holder (B, see Figure 2-4) and unlocking the cam lever (C).
- 4. Install the Anaconda on the Picatinny/Weaver rail in front of the day scope so that the stop (E, see Figure 2-2) slides into one of the rail's transverse slot. The light suppressor should cover the day scope's objective lens.
- 5. Affix the Anaconda to the rail by locking the cam lever (C, see Figure 2-4).
- 6. Verify that the clamping device is firmly secured to the Anaconda. If necessary, adjust the clamping device as detailed in Part 2.1.3 (Clamping Device Adjustment).

2.1.3 CLAMPING DEVICE ADJUSTMENT

To adjust the mount's clamping device, do the following (refer to Figure 2-5):

- 1. Unlock the clamping device and remove the Anaconda from the weapon.
- 2. To tighten/loosen the clamping device (B), push the cam (C) towards the arrow, which will cause the nut (A) to slide out of its hole. Turn the nut (A) CW/CCW respectively, in one-two increments (see note below). Backward-moving springs will cause the nut (A) to slide back into the hole.

NOTE:

The eight-sided nut of the clamping device will only fit into the hole if turned in one of the discrete positions using increments equal to 360°/8.

3. Verify that the adjusted clamping device is firmly secured to the Anaconda.

2.1.4 INSTALLING THE ANACONDA TC50-640 ON THE LENS OF A DAY SCOPE

Use the optional Scope Mounting System (SMS) to install the Anaconda TC-50-640 onto day scope lenses.

NOTE:

The adapters differ in attaching diameters and must fit with the day scope parameters specified in Table 5-7 (Scope Mounting Systems Data).

NOTE:

The Anaconda cannot be attached to scopes that include focus rings on the housing of the objective lens.

CAUTION:

Scope Mounting Systems are not recommended for installing the Anaconda on firearms with dynamic recoil (0.308 Win or stronger).

Figure 2-6 shows the Anaconda TC50-640 installed on the lens of a day scope.

Install the Anaconda on the lens of a day scope as follows (refer to Figure 2-7):

- 1. Using a 2.5 mm Allen key, unscrew the M4×8 screws securing the Anaconda mount. Remove the mount from the seating rail and place it, along with the screws, into the storage case.
- 2. Take off the output lens cap and put it into the storage case.
- 3. With the nut (B) loosened, place the insert (C) into the SMS's clamp (A).
- 4. Screw the SMS into the Anaconda's output lens thread.
- 5. With the nut (B) loosened, slide the Anaconda with the SMS onto the lens of the day scope as far as it goes.
- 6. Tighten the nut (B) using a screwdriver.

If the position of the SMS's clamping nut is uncomfortable, change it as follows:

- 1. Decide on desirable position of the nut and estimate the angle through which the SMS should be turned CW (see Figure 2-8).
- 2. Remove the SMS from the Anaconda.
- 3. Using a screwdriver, remove the M2×2.5 screws (F, see Figure 2-7) and then unscrew the ring (E).

CAUTION:

To loosen the ring (E, Figure 2-7), use the two auxiliary non-threaded holes (D). DO NOT USE the threaded ones.

- 4. Using a lathe or other precision cutting tool, cut the inside face of the ring (E, Figure 2-7). The value of cuts (in millimeters) should be equal to the value of the turning angle (in angular degrees) divided by 360°.
- 5. Screw the ring (E) into the SMS's body with its cut end directed inwards. Tighten the screw.
- 6. After applying a small amount of thread lock to the threads, affix the ring (E) using the two M2×2.5 screws (F).

2.1.5 INSTALLING THE LIGHT SUPPRESSOR FOR A DAY SCOPE

The Light Suppressor for a Day Scope (A, Figure 2-9) slides over the eyepiece of your daytime scope (B). The suppressor can be used with scopes that have 40-43 mm eyepiece diameters and 100-120 mm eye relief.

The suppressor can be adjusted for the eye relief of your scope by cutting the rubber at the desired distance (C).

2.1.6 FASTENING THE WIRELESS REMOTE CONTROL TO A WEAPON

Using Velcro[®] tape (A, Figure 2-10), fasten the remote control (B) to your weapon in an easily accessible place (e.g., on the front of the rifle stock).

If your rifle has a Picatinny or Weaver rail on the front end, you can use the Picatinny adaptor for the wireless remote (C). Install the adaptor onto the rail (D). Insert the remote control unit into the adapter.

2.1.7 INSTALLING ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT

Use the side Picatinny/Weaver rail to install any additional equipment, such as the AGM HD Video Recorder, WiFi Attachment, or the Extended Battery Pack.

2.1.8 CONNECTING AN ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT

CAUTION:

Turn off the Anaconda before removing the batteries or connecting/disconnecting any external equipment.

Remove the connector protective cap (see Figure 1-2).

Connect a cable of the external 5V battery bank to the Anaconda Micro-USB connector.

Connect a cable of Digital Video Recorder, WiFi Attachment, or the Extended Battery Pack to the Anaconda S620 universal connector.

Use the video cable plug (A, Figure 2-12) to connect an external video recorder/monitor/TV to the Anaconda. Connect the video cable plug (C) to the Anaconda S620 universal connector.

Use the video cable plug (B) to connect an external power source (6 VDC/ 600 mA) to the Anaconda. Connect the video cable plug (C) to the Anaconda S620 universal connector.

NOTE:

The external power supply must have a standard OD double-pole socket with a positive central contact.

CAUTION:

After removing the cable, replace the protective cap over the connector.

2.2 CONTROLS AND DISPLAY INDICATIONS

2.2.1 CONTROLS

CAUTION:

DO NOT force the equipment controls past their stopping points.

The Anaconda controls are shown in Figure 2-13 and are defined in Table 2-1. The ITEM column indicate the numbers used to identify items in the figures.

NOTE:

Various display symbols indicating the current operating state of the Anaconda can be displayed permanently, may appear momentarily, or can be set to appear only when a certain function is activated.

The Anaconda button control panel is shown in Figure 2-14.

Table 2-2 contains the button functions and their brief descriptions. The ITEM column of the table indicates the number used to identify buttons in Figure 2-14.

NOTE:

Each button is responsible for some functions selected by briefly pushing or holding down the button, or using the button in combination with a second one (as described in Table 2-2). Pushing a button for 1.5+ second is considered "holding down."

2.2.2 MAIN MENU

Most setup options can be accessed from the MAIN MENU.

To display the MAIN MENU, push and hold down the MENU button (5) on the control panel (Figure 2-15). Push and hold down the MENU button again to exit the menu.

Once the MAIN MENU is displayed (Figure 2-16), use the UP and DOWN buttons (Figure 2-15) to navigate through the items on the menu.

Push the OK button to view the settings available for the item selected.

NOTES:

Navigate through submenu items by pushing the UP and DOWN button, except where otherwise expressly indicated. The LEFT and RIGHT buttons are available only when specified on the menu screen with < > symbols.

After a menu item is selected, push the OK button to make the selected setting/ activate the selected function.

Select the EXIT item and then push the OK button to return to the MAIN MENU.

Palette Menu

The PALETTE menu (Figures 2-17 and 2-18) allows the user to select from a choice of temperature imaging modes: White Hot, Black Hot, Fusion, Rainbow, Globow, Ironbow 1, Ironbow 2, Sepia, Color 1, Color 2, Ice-Fire, Rain, and OEM Custom.

NOTE:

To navigate through the items on the two-page PALETTE menu, hold down the UP/ DOWN button.

The palettes act as color templates for visualizing temperature changes in the scene.

NOTE:

The most popular palettes are White Hot and Black Hot, usually known as inversion. White Hot mode is good for spotting targets, while Black Hot mode is most useful for situational reading.

NOTE:

Training and experience are required to quickly and properly interpret the thermal image being displayed.

Temperature Menu

The TEMPERATURE menu (Figure 2-19) allows the user to select varying temperature detection graphics in the display field of view.

Select Display Off to remove all temperature data from the display.

Select Numeric Only for a numerical representation of the temperature data on the display. The current temperature of the object or scene in the center of the field of view will be printed on the display.

Select Thermometer Only for a graphical representation of the temperature data on the display. The current temperature of the object or scene in the center of the FOV will be indicated by a graphical thermometer.

Select Numeric-Thermometer item for both numerical and graphical representation of the temperature data on the display.

Reticle Menu

The RETICLE menu (Figure 2-20) allows the user to select from a choice of reticle patterns: Dot 4 MOA, Line Dot, Cross Center Dot, Cross, Crosshair.

To select the reticle type push the LEFT or RIGHT button. Push the OK button to confirm selection.

Boresight Menu

The boresight function allows the user to changing the reticle position in the display. Figure 2-21 shows the BORESIGHT screen.

NOTE:

Remember that the center of impact on the target shifts in the opposite direction from the direction that the reticle shifts. So, to bring the center of impact to the right/left and up/down, you must shift the reticle to the left/right and down/up, respectively.

For display coordinates, the origin is the center of the display. The running coordinate of the reticle is the number of incremental shifts of the reticle from the center of the display. The minus sign appears before the displayed number when the reticle shifts left or down (the point of impact (POI) on the target shifts right or up, respectively).

Push the LEFT and RIGHT buttons to adjust for windage. Moving the reticle in the positive direction (to the right) will move the POI to the left. Moving the reticle in the negative direction (to the left) will move the POI to the right.

Push the UP and DOWN buttons to adjust for elevation. Moving the reticle in the positive directly (up) will move the POI down. Moving the reticle in the negative direction (down) will move the POI up.

Every time one of these buttons is pushed, the reticle shifts a single pixel increment corresponding to the minimum boresight correction value, and the **point of impact** on the target moves according to the specified windage/elevation boresight increment, in the opposite direction to that of the shifting reticle.

Every time one of these buttons is pushed for 3 sec, then the reticle begins to shift in 4 pixels increments untill you let go.

Holding down the combination of buttons (LEFT+RIGHT) to reset to zero azimuth and elevation the reticle will shift to the display center.

You can use RIFLE PROFILE function of Setting menu (Rifle Profile 1, Rifle Profile 2, Rifle Profile 3) to save the boresighted reticle position map up to 3 different rifles (see part 2.3.2 for more details).

Scenarios Menu

The SCENARIOS menu (Figure 2-22) allows the operator to select from a choice of hunting scenarios or turn the scenarios off. When a scenario is selected, the display image of the object with the correct temperature will be colorized for easy detection.

The icon of the selected scenario is displayed at the bottom of the main screen.

Corrections Menu

The CORRECTIONS menu (Figure 2-23) allows the user to select from a choice of filter patterns. The different field environments are pre-set with the correction filters valued for the best field performance.

The icon of the selected correction is displayed at the bottom of the main screen.

Settings Menu

The SETTINGS menu (Figure 2-24) allows direct changes to the save rifle profiles, video standard, temperature units, display left margin, display top margin, and factory default setting.

The <u>RIFLE PROFILE</u> function allows the user to bore sight the Anaconda to the weapon/day scope and then save the bore sighted reticle position map in the "Rifle Profile" tab. This can be done for 3 different setaps (Profile 1, Profile 2, and Profile 3).

The <u>STANDARD</u> function allows the user to select from a choice of NTSC or PAL video standard.

The <u>LEFT MARGIN</u> function allows the user to move the display left/right by a fixed number of pixels.

The <u>TOP MARGIN</u> function allows to move the display up/down by a fixed number of pixels.

NOTE:

After configuration is complete, select EXIT on the MAIN MENU and push the OK button to leave the MAIN MENU. All settings will be saved.

2.3 OPERATING PROCEDURES

2.3.1 OPERATING

Always make sure your firearm is unloaded before you place the equipment on the firearm. Always verify that the chamber is empty, especially if you stop the procedure and resume later. Safe handling rules should be followed at all times.

CAUTION:

DO NOT force the equipment controls past their stopping points.

CAUTION:

To prevent thermal damage to the equipment, never point it (either ON or OFF) directly at the sun or any other source of high intensity light that the unprotected human eye cannot tolerate (such as a welding arc). To prevent accidental exposure to these sources, never leave the equipment around without first securing the objective lens cap.

Operating procedures are as follows:

- 1. Remove the Anaconda from the carrying case.
- 2. Install the Anaconda on the weapon with a day scope. Refer to Parts 2.1.2-2.1.4 for installation procedures.
- 3. Verify that the Anaconda is securely mounted to the weapon or scope.
- 4. Remove the protective caps.
- 5. Point the equipment at an object.
- 6. Activate the Anaconda by turning the operating switch ON. After approximately 3 sec, video of the thermal scene should appear.
- 7. If the day scope includes a focusing ring (i.e., parallax adjustment knob), adjust the focus for a parallax-free image.
- 8. Turn on the day scope's reticle illumination and adjust the reticle brightness.
- 9. Adjust the focus of Anaconda by turning the focus ring (CW for far focus, CCW for near focus).

NOTE:

The total focus range is covered with 3/4 turns of the objective focus ring.

10. Using the buttons on the control panel (Figure 2-25), configure the Anaconda for your specific situation.

For more information on operational setting procedures, see Part 2.2 (Controls and Display Indications).

A. Adjust the brightness of the display to your preferred level.

Push the brightness adjustment buttons to increase (1)/decrease (3) the display brightness by one level at a time until you reach your desired brightness level.

B. Use UCMNUC/ FFC (User-Controlled Manual Non-Uniformity Correction/ Flat-Field Correction) function to improve image quality. As the camera and the detector heat up during use, the detector pixels will drift. The pixels do not drift uniformly. The camera software

compensates for the drift up to an accurate position point, but when the limit is reached the UCMNUC/ FFC function is triggered. A uniform mechanical shutter is placed between the lens and the detector for a moment and the signal is processed.

Push and hold the two brightness control buttons (1 and 3) at the same time to manually trigger the User-Controlled Manual Non-Uniformity Correction/ Flat-Field Correction.

If necessary, interrupt the automatic UCMNUC/ FFC process by pushing the OK button (5) on the control panel during the 5-second countdown, which will appear at the bottom of the display.

- C. Use the image palettes for optimal visualization of temperature changes in the scene. Hold down the palette control button (2) to scroll through available palettes. The palette name will appear in the top part of the display.
- D. Turns reticle ON/ OFF.

Push and hold button (2) to turn reticle ON or OFF.

E. Select the color of the reticle.

Momentarily push the reticle color control button (4) to select among black, white, red, and cyan.

F. Select a reticle pattern.

Push and hold button (4) to select from a choice of reticle patterns: Dot 4 MOA, Line Dot, Cross Center Dot, Cross, Crosshair.

G. Use digital zoom to magnify the central area of the displayed scene.

Momentarily push the zoom control button (2) to slowly magnify into the displayed scene. The 2x, 4x, 8x symbols (maximum zoom factor is dependent of model) will appear in the bottom part of the display.

NOTE:

Digital zoom allows distant objects to appear larger; however, the resolution will be compromised.

NOTE:

Digital zoom help target detection and discrimination.

H. Adjust the necessary adjustment using the MAIN MENU. See Part 2.2.2 (Using the MAIN MENU).

NOTE:

After configuration is complete, select EXIT on the MAIN MENU and push the OK button to leave the MAIN MENU. All settings will be saved.

- 11. To align the barrel of the weapon, place the reticle on the desired target. To allow for the bullet's travel (i.e. bullet drop, windage, and the target mobility), adjust the boresight of the day scope.
- 12. To operate the Anaconda with wireless remote control, turn the function switch to the STB position (Standby). After it the Remote Control button can activate/ deactivate the device in two ways:

1) To turn the device on, press the remote control button once, to turn it off – press the button again.

2) To operate the device in short-time activation mode (see note below), press and hold the remote control button down for 1.5+ seconds. Release the remote control button to deactivate the device.

CAUTION:

DO NOT leave the equipment activated when not in use.

2.3.2 ELECTRONIC ACCURACY CORRECTION

All Anaconda are adjusted on the laboratory test equipment with accuracy aligned to 1 MOA or better. The final accuracy depends on customer riflescope, parallax of used rifle scope and shooting distance.

To achieve better result accuracy, use BORESIGHT function in main menu (see part 2.2.2 for more detailed).

Turn on the reticle display by pressing and holding the RIGHT button. Enter the BORESIGHT menu and adjust the position of the attachment reticle so that it coincides with the center of the day riflescope reticle.

2.3.3 ANACONDA SHUT-DOWN

NOTE:

Shut down the Anaconda to properly to avoid losing unsaved settings and data.

Shutdown the Anaconda as follows:

- 1. Be sure to save your settings and data.
- 2. Turn off the Anaconda.
- 3. Replace the cap on the objective lens.
- 4. Disconnect the cable (if applicable).
- 5. Place the cap on the connector.
- 6. Dismount the Anaconda from the weapon.
- 7. Remove the batteries.

CAUTION:

Do not store the Anaconda with the batteries still installed.

8. Store the Anaconda and all accessories in the carrying case.

3 MAINTENANCE INSTRUCTIONS

3.1 OPERATOR TROUBLESHOOTING

The purpose of troubleshooting is to identify the most frequent equipment malfunctions, probable causes, and corrective actions required.

Table 3-1 lists the common malfunctions that may be found during the operation or maintenance of the Anaconda. Perform the tests/inspections and corrective actions in the order listed.

This table does not list all of the malfunctions that may occur with your device, or all of the tests and corrective actions that may be necessary. If you experience an equipment malfunction that is not listed, or is not fixed by the corrective actions listed in the table, please contact Customer Service center.

3.2 MAINTENANCE

3.2.1 GENERAL

The Anaconda operator maintenance consists of operational tests, inspections for unit serviceability, cleaning and mounting procedures, corrective actions (troubleshooting and replacement of a limited number of parts). Maintenance instructions covered elsewhere in this manual (PMCS, troubleshooting, etc.) are not repeated in this section.

CAUTION:

The Anaconda is a precision electro-optical instrument and must be handled carefully at all times to prevent damage.

CAUTION:

DO NOT dismantle the equipment.

3.2.2 CLEANING PROCEDURES

Clean the Anaconda and optional items as follows:

- 1. Gently brush off any dirt from the equipment using only a clean, soft cloth.
- 2. Moisten the cloth with fresh water and gently wipe the external surfaces (except for optical surfaces).
- 3. Dry any wet surfaces (except for optical surfaces) with another clean, dry soft cloth.
- 4. Using a lens brush, carefully remove all loose dirt from optical surfaces (objective lens and output lens).
- 5. Slightly dampen a cotton swab with alcohol and gently wipe optical surface. Clean the optical surface using circular movements, starting from the center and moving out towards the edge.

Do not touch the lens holder. Change the cotton swab after each circular stroke. Repeat until the optical surface is clean.

6. Clean the battery contact surfaces and contact springs with a pencil eraser and/or alcohol and cotton swabs.

CAUTION:

Thoroughly dry all items before placing them into the storage/carrying case.

3.2.3 BATTERY REMOVAL AND REPLACEMENT

Refer to Part 3.1.1 for battery installation procedures.

Replace the remote control battery as follows:

1. Using a screwdriver, unscrew the four screws (A, Figure 3-1) that secure the cover to the bottom of the unit. Remove the cover.

- 2. Replace the battery with new one (CR2032, 3V). Install the battery, aligning their polarity markings (+/-) with those embossed on the compartment.
- 3. Replace the cover and tighten the screws (A).
